- On behalf of all parishioners I delivered a sympathy card to Archbishop Sample on the recent death of his mom. In addition to the card the parish is remembering his mom with three Mass Intentions: January 8, 13 & 14
- We are holding a **warm clothing/blanket drive**. Bring us your clean and new or slightly-used jackets, sweatshirts, coats, sweater, hats, gloves, socks, blankets and sleeping bags. - Thank you to all who made pledges for your Saturday/Sunday contributions for 2018. Pledges take effect Jan 1.
- Friday, February 2 is the feast of the Presentation of the Lord. It is also known as "Candlemas Day". It is the day that candles are blessed. The blessing takes place at the beginning of 9 am Mass on February 2. Bring your candles that you would like blessed.
- You can start bringing your palm branches to Church and place them in the metal container near the baptismal font.
- The palm branches will be burned at our Fat Tuesday Pancake dinner, on the evening of Tuesday, February 13.
- For Lent, which begins in a month on Ash Wednesday, February 14, we will have faith sharing groups using Pope Francis' encyclical **Laudato Si'** as the basis for our learning, prayer and discussion. This encyclical is also known by its English title: "On Care for our Common Home". Sign up sheets will soon be available for you to join one of the small Lenten groups. Everyone is encouraged to participate in one of the groups.
- This week is Martin Luther King Day (January 15) and St. Anthony, Abbot day (January 17) and the start of week of prayer for Christian Unity (January 18). Also, on January 20, the sun will set after 5 pm for the first time in a couple of months. Can Spring be far behind???

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity January 18-25, 2018

The theme of this year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is "Your Right Hand, O Lord, Glorious in Power." (*Exodus 15:6*). According to *Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute (GEII)*. . . , "Throughout the Biblical narrative of salvation, an unmistakable motif is the unrelenting determination of the Lord to form a people whom He could call His own. The formation of such a people, united in a sacred covenant with God, is integral to the Lord's plan of salvation and to the glorification of His name. The prophets repeatedly remind Israel that their covenant demanded that relationships among its various social groups should be characterized by justice, compassion and mercy. Reconciliation often demands repentance, reparation and healing of memories."

The commemorative centennial mugs that were handed out at Christmas should not be washed in the dishwasher. They should be washed by hand. The dishwasher will wash off the commemorative logo or at least make it fade. If you did not get a commemorative centennial mug, it is still possible to get one, one mug per family. Also books are available, one book per family.

The Blessing of the Chalk took place at last weekend's Masses. This chalk may be used to write a blessing above or around your door, invoking Christ and the three Magi to be a blessing to all who enter and leave your home. Remember that the blessed chalk is a sacramental and should be treated respectfully, like a holy card. It is not a toy, nor should it be thrown in the garbage. After you use it to write a blessing at your door, I'd say you can use the chalk as chalk, but any leftover piece should be buried in a place that will not be disturbed, or you can bring it to Fr. Pat in the envelope.

NATIONAL MIGRATION WEEK: January 7-13, 2018 For nearly a half century, the Catholic Church in the United States has celebrated National Migration Week, an opportunity for the Church to reflect on the circumstances confronting immigrants, refugees, children, and victims and survivors of human trafficking. The theme for National Migration Week 2018, "Many Journeys, One Family," highlights the fact that each of our families have a migration story, some recent and others in the distant past. Regardless of where we came from, we remain part of the human family and are called to live in solidarity with one another.

Unfortunately, in our contemporary culture we often fail to see migrants as persons, and instead look at them as unknown others, if we notice them at all. We do not take the time to engage migrants as fellow children of God, but remain aloof to their presence and suspicious or fearful of them. During this National Migration Week, let us all take the opportunity to engage migrants as community members, neighbors, and friends.
